**"Dmanisi, Georgia on my mind: The earliest humans outside of Africa and their significance for human evolution"**

Dr. Adam Van Arsdale, youngest son of Pastor Dave, is a biological anthropologist who teaches at Wellesley College. His primary research interests are in the area of paleoanthropology and understanding the human fossil record. His work involves him in questions regarding contemporary patterns of human variation as well, including the relationship between ideas of race and biological variation.

Adam received his Ph.D. in Anthropology from Michigan in 2006. His doctoral research was based on analyses of recent hominid fossil discoveries from the Lower Pleistocene site of Dmanisi, Georgia. After spending four years as part of the excavation team at Dmanisi, Adam's dissertation examined the exceptional pattern of variation found within the mandibular sample from the site.

Adam's teaching at Wellesley College covers several areas within biological anthropology including human evolution, anatomy and genetic variation, as well as the intersection between human biological variation and societal practices associated with human biology.
